They would much rather play with their dolls...




or watch cartoons...

"Here are your shirtsy-wirtsies," she said. "I'll help you put them on."




But she put them on their legs!




"Here are your socky-wockies," she said. "I'll help you put them on."

"Grandma!" squealed the girls. "You did it all wrong!"




"Oh, dear!" exclaimed Grandma. "What shall we do?"




"No problem!" replied the girls, laughing.



Clothes started flying through the air, and...




they put everything exactly where it belonged.

"You're silly!" exclaimed the girls.




"Quick! Kisses, kisses!" said Grandma, and off the girls went to school.




